

BEST BUDDIES CHAPTER PARTNERSHIP GUIDE

PURPOSE

This guide has been created in conjunction with Best Buddies International to provide the men of Pi Kappa Phi the tools necessary to connect with existing Best Buddies chapters, to establish new Best Buddies chapters, and take advantage of opportunities that promote the mission of both Best Buddies and The Ability Experience.

ABOUT BEST BUDDIES

Best Buddies International is the world's largest nonprofit organization devoted solely to providing opportunities for friendship, employment, and leadership development for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). Through the creation of meaningful, lasting one-to-one friendships with peers without disabilities and the promotion of integrated employment opportunities, Best Buddies is changing the world one friendship and one job at a time.

Best Buddies serves as a lifeline to the joy of having lifelong friendships, improving leadership skills, securing successful jobs, and feeling valued by society. People and employers without IDD who engage in Best Buddies programs help change prejudicial stereotypes, find common ground, and promote the integration of people with IDD.

EXPECTATIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

To be matched in a one-to-one friendship all students must:

- Have the desire and ability to form a mutually enriching friendship.
- Attend global volunteer training conducted by the chapter leadership prior to being matched. (Best Buddies staff will provide the training curriculum to all chapter leaders of approved Best Buddies expansion chapters.)

To fulfill the role of peer buddy/buddy and remain in good standing, all students must:

- Plan outings with their peer buddy/buddy twice a month.
- Contact their peer buddy/buddy once a week (by phone, e-mail, social media, or in person).
- Attend all chapter meetings and group activities with their peer buddy/buddy.
- Honor the one-to-one commitment for an entire academic year.
- Complete a monthly friendship update to report weekly contact and monthly activities on Best Buddies Online.

CONNECTING WITH AN EXISTING BEST BUDDIES CHAPTER

There are 83 campuses where both Best Buddies and Pi Kappa Phi have a chapter. See Appendix A to find out if your campus has an existing Best Buddies chapter. If so, contact the state director for your state (Appendix B.) STEPS TO ESTABLISH A NEW BEST BUDDIES CHAPTER

1. Speak with Best Buddies Staff

- Contact the Best Buddies State Director to discuss the expectations and timeline. State Directors are listed in *Appendix B* of this guide. If there is no state director for your state, contact <u>chapterservices@abilityexperience.org</u> to be connected with the appropriate Best Buddies staff.
- 2. Identify Key Players and Host Site
 - Chapter president: student who will lead the chapter
 - Faculty advisor: school staff who will support the chapter
 - Host site coordinator: staff from host site who will coordinate members with IDD
 - The host site: an organization in the area that serves adults with disabilities with whom students will be matched. Information on securing a host site can be found by reviewing our host site resource.
- 3. Garner Interest

Spread the exciting word that Best Buddies is coming to town! Identify officers and people with and without IDD who want to be matched in a one-to-one friendship.

Annual Leadership Conference

The Best Buddies International Leadership Conference brings together leaders with and without IDD from middle schools, high schools, and colleges worldwide, providing personalized trainings to develop skills needed to organize a Best Buddies chapter. For the past 25 years, Leadership Conference has inspired thousands of leaders to be Best Buddies advocates and bring about social change in their communities

Team Best Buddies Endurance Program

Team Best Buddies (TBB) is an endurance event program that enables athletes of all abilities to dedicate their training and participation in marathons, triathlons, cycling, and other endurance events to the life-changing movement of inclusion.
